#### A look back......

As another year draws to a close, the stewardship committee thought it important to look back at the life of NKUC through 2025. All things considered, it was a very successful and fulfilling time for our church.

We began the year with the publication of a new church directory, which was undertaken by the Men's Group. Participation was excellent and by early summer, the directories were available to all those who

had their photos taken. Right on the heels of that, we celebrated the United Church of Canada's 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary with a formal dinner and entertainment.

As the year progressed, we held our annual fundraising events; our Plant Sale, Quiz Night, the Morden's Chocolate and Nut Sale, as well as the FundScrip event. We also held several meat sales and for the first time, an Envelope Event, which was very successful.

Renting our church twice a week, this congregation's rent contributed substantially to our revenue stream. However, this group purchased their own facility and left us at the end of June. Another congregation now rents the church every Sunday afternoon. However, they are much smaller in numbers, making our rental income substantially lower. We would like to remind the congregation that we have many spaces ideal for rent for meetings, showers, dinners etc.

2026 will see us facing some challenges financially especially with constantly rising costs. In the spring, we will hold a garage sale which usually brings a strong response and a good profit. We ask that you keep the community of faith of NKUC in your prayers and prayerfully consider your continued financial support.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to all who have supported our church, through weekly offerings, as well as assisting and contributing to our fundraising events throughout the year.

# REPORT ON PRAIRIE TO PINE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING: NOVEMBER 13, 2025

This year's Prairie to Pine AGM was limited to one evening meeting via Zoom (down from two meetings in 2024), as many aspects of the AGM will wait until next May's in-person Annual General Meeting in Selkirk. Key aspects of this year's meeting are as follows:

<u>Nominations</u>: Lynn Sanderson, Chair of the Nominations Committee thanked both Ministers and Laity who have volunteered in various capacities. Vacancies remain on a number of committees, and faith communities are encouraged to identify those in their faith communities who might be appropriate for vacant positions. Prairie to Pine should also be notified about changes to the Board make-up for faith communities.

<u>Towards 2035 Presentation</u>: Cam Fraser and Jordan Cantwell provided a presentation on the Towards 2035 initiative. It is about envisioning the future, not bemoaning its decline. It is based on the conviction that the story of Jesus matters, and so the importance of perceiving what God is doing and determining how we will respond.

Statistics were presented showing that in 1991 the United Church was the denomination with the second highest affiliation in Canada, while in 2021 "no religion" was the most common church affiliation noted. It is projected that by 2035 United Church affiliation will decline to 111,000 from 321,000 in 2023, but the number of pastoral charges will decline very little. About 2,000 people joined the United Church in 2024 and there were 24 emerging migrant faith communities in that same year. In a survey conducted between 2022 and 2025, 49% believed in a higher power, 45% engaged in prayer and 60% felt a sense of stress or encountered difficulty in their mental well-being. This all seems to point to the continued relevance of faith in Canada.

Several "threads" were noted: a) Can we articulate why the Good News is good news? b) Lean into prayer and listening c) Importance of connection d) Emphasis on invitation d) Where are Interfaith and Intercultural communities? Resource materials on this initiative will be made available to faith communities in the next few weeks.

<u>Stewardship</u>: Vicki Nelson (Stewardship Support Lead for Prairie to Pine) provided information on some stewardship initiatives within the Region. One is a training program related to stewardship entitled Called to be the Church: The Journey. Vicki encouraged faith communities to be in touch with her for information about this or to obtain ideas about approaches to stewardship and increasing generosity within your faith community that might be helpful, including M&S. She can be reached at <a href="mailto:vnelson@united-church.ca">vnelson@united-church.ca</a>. She also mentioned the availability of grant funding through the United Church of Canada Foundation.

<u>General Council 45 Overview</u>: Emma Seamone and Tricia Gerhard, Commissioners to the General Council spoke about the work of the General Council, including the process for the development of proposals and the process that was followed in framing the apology to the LBGTQ+ community. Shannon McCarthy outlined the progress towards establishing an autonomous Indigenous organization within the framework of the United Church of Canada.
